54-58 A.D.	Paul's Third Missionary Journey
58 A.D.	Paul's Arrest in Jerusalem
58-60 A.D.	Paul's two years in prison in Caesarea
60 A.D.	Paul's Voyage to Rome
61-63 A.D.	Two years in Paul's First Roman Imprisonment
64 A.D.	The Burning of Rome
70 A.D.	The Destruction of Jerusalem
